Canine Harness Fit and Function

Harnesses come in all shapes and sizes, just as dogs do! Many owners do not notice a poorly fitting harness and the implications it has on the dog's posture, joint alignment, muscles and mobility while wearing the harness. Over the miles, while wearing it, an ill-fitting harness can cause thoracic rotation, misalignment of extremities and lead to future joint ailments, as well as being just plain uncomfortable for the dog. The poorly fitting harness has the ability to alter posture and require of the dog a need to counteract its effect. External forces produced by a poorly fitting harness can create the following effects on the dog:

1. <u>Altered neural inputs resulting in greater effort and position errors</u>. For example, a harness that is positioned directly over the shoulder joints (pictured below) results in the dog's perception that every forward motion of the front leg is met with the signal that the shoulder is not allowed to extend as much as the dog would like it to.





2. <u>Postural shifts affecting balance and center of gravity</u>. The photographs below show a harness with a front center clip. You can see that a pull on the leash will pull the body's center of gravity off balance and result in the dog having to correct the feeling of being tipped off balance.





3. <u>Effects on soft tissue, skin, fascia and trigger points can result in internal organ dysfunction</u>. The photograph below shows a harness with a clip between the shoulder blades that is so tight that an indent remains even when the harness is removed and the harness itself pulls at the skin and soft tissue in multiple directions.



4. Reduced neuro-biomechanical function and respiration capacity. The photographs below demonstrate harnesses that are so tight around the ribs that they reduce full thoracic and lung expansion, especially critical in hot weather or with fast pace or jogging, where increased oxygen requirements are needed.

There are many brands and types of harnesses available. Be sure to observe the fit of the harness and the forces it will place on your dog's body when he is wearing it or when you are attached to the other end of the lead

General guidelines for a properly-fit canine harness:

- Harness should be snug to prevent the dog backing out of it. As a rule, you should not be able to place more than two fingers between the harness and the dog and two finger distance should prevent pinching or inhibiting movement or breathing. The dog's armpit area should also be monitored for chafing or the harness being too snug.
- Harness should not place pressure on the dog's throat area.
- Harness should not cross directly over the shoulder joint.
- Front clip harnesses should be used for training purposes only in cases where the dog pulls and will not follow the owner. This type may create balance and chiropractic issues if used regularly.
- Back clip harnesses are recommended and the clip should be well forward on the harness which may help to control forward momentum.
